



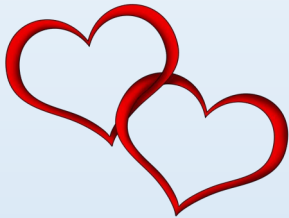
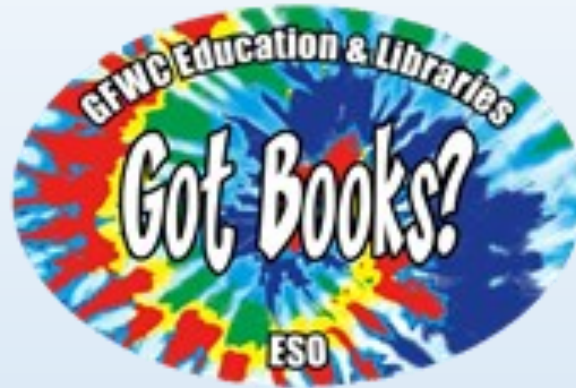

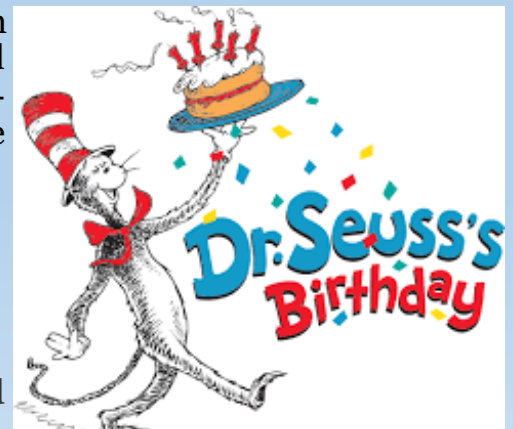
Read Across America Week is celebrated from March 2 to 6

Read Across America 2023 is a special day designed to encourage children to enjoy reading. Held each year on the anniversary of legendary children's author Dr. Seuss' birthday, Read Across America Day seeks to inspire readers about the wonders of reading. It is estimated that 45 million Americans are functionally illiterate, meaning they cannot read above a fifth-grade level. Read Across America seeks to destigmatize this issue and inspire children to find the beauty and joy in the pleasure of reading. Evidence shows that children learn 4,000 to 12,000 new words annually if they read regularly. Reading also boosts memory skills and reduces stress, meaning that many skills can be targeted just by picking up a book with your kids. Good literacy skills are linked with children accessing the entire curriculum, helping to benefit their learning across the board. As Dr. Seuss said, *"The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go."*

Read Across America Day takes place on Dr. Seuss' birthday, March 2. This is part of National Reading Month, which takes place throughout March.

Read Across America Day originated as an initiative organized by the National Education Association in 1998 to have a special day dedicated to inspiring children to read. From this original day of celebration, Read Across America became a year-round program developed to promote reading in schools. Since then, the event has now become a national movement, with influential figures such as former first lady Michelle Obama taking part in bringing awareness to the cause.

- Plan an event or volunteer with your library to bring *sparkle* to this celebration.
- Read a Dr. Seuss book to a child or grandchild.
- Buy a Dr. Seuss book for a public school or day care.
- Inform your members about Read Across America and encourage reading for all ages.

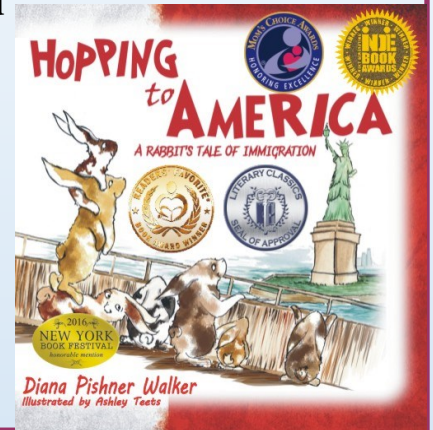


Member Author Featured
